LADO (Local Authority Designated Officer) can be contacted on 0151 443 4077. The LADO works within Children's Services and should be alerted to all cases in which it is alleged that a person who works with children has:

- behaved in a way that has harmed, or may have harmed, a child;
- possibly committed a criminal offence against children, or related to a child or
- behaved towards a child or children in a way that indicates they may pose a risk of harm to children.

Child protection is everybody's responsibility and all people in the school community have a statutory duty to act on any concern.

At Park View Academy we may consider that aggressive, abusive or insulting behaviour, or language from a parent presents a risk to staff or pupils. It is enough for a member of staff or a pupil to feel threatened. In such a circumstance schools have a power in common law to bar the parent from the premises.
